Field Trips: Birding the Neighborhood

Schedule: November Field Trips

November 7: GCSD

The first Wednesday of every month Jeanne Ridgley will lead a birding walk at the Groveland Community Services property at 18966 Ferretti Road, Groveland. The next walk will be on November 7. The property encompasses an area of more than 200 acres of oak, pine and willow habitat with three water storage ponds. 131 species of birds have been seen there since November of 2007. Jeanne will meet the group in the GCSD parking lot at 8:00 a.m. Bring binoculars and a birding field guide if you have one. Rain will cancel the trip. The walk will last about two-three hours. November 10: Away Trip/Consumnes River Preserve.

This area, in the southernmost part of Sacramento county, has a magnificent diversity of beautiful habitats. You can expect to see a wide selection of birds, and with Sal's keen ear at work, you can count on hearing them as well. Meet at the Stanislaus Library parking lot at 1500 "I" Street, at 7:00 a.m. Take Highway 99 north to Exit 277, Highway 104 lone/Jackson/Twin Cities exit, midway between Stockton and Sacramento. Take Twin Cities Road west for about 6 miles and turn left onto Bruceville Road. Continue south and at the end turn right onto Desmond Road. Follow Desmond Road for about a mile over the Railroad tracks and turn left on to Franklin Boulevard. Continue down Franklin Boulevard and park in the lot just past the Visitor Center. An alternate is to meet at 8:00 a.m. at the Consumnes River Preserve Visitors Center (opens at 9:00 a.m.), 13501 Franklin Blvd., in Galt. Info: consumnes.org, (916) 684-2816. We'll be finished by mid-afternoon.

November 17: Calaveras County/Camp Nine Road

Trip leader: Bea Hollers. Contact: Ken Smith at 949-922-1445. Bea has covered this area on the Calaveras Christmas Count for years and lives in the area. Meet at 9:00 a.m. at the Vallecito Post Office, 3511 Main St., Vallecito (Main Street is an alternate loop through Vallecito and connects from Parrots Ferry Road to Highway 4). There is a good spot for Bald Eagles at the river. It can be cold at the river so dress accordingly.

November 18: Tuolumne County/New Melones Reservoir

Trip Leader Pamela Blair, (209) 324-7000. Meet at 9:00 a.m. at the New Melones Visitor Center on Highway 49. Look for the sign and entrance road as you approach the bridge across the reservoir. The center is east of the highway and is not visible from the highway. The area is an oak/grassland savannah. Look for Lewis's Woodpecker, Western or Clarks Grebes and fall migrating birds.

Nome, Alaska, June 2013!!

Far, Far "Away" Field Trips!

Rich Cimino, who presented our September program, is leading five birding field trips to Nome, Alaska starting May 28, June 1, 6, 10 and 14, 2013. He will donate \$150.00 for every Central Sierra Audubon Society member that goes on one of the trips. Nome is a frontier town accessible only by boat and airplane. Bordered on the west and south by the Bering Sea, and the north and east by miles of trackless wilderness, Nome is a fascinating birding destination. During June and July the Midnight Sun is at its brightest, the tundra is in full bloom, and the birds and mammals are breeding. The tour will cover the prime birding areas along the seacoast and the beautifully blooming alpine tundra surrounding Nome. Most of the birds are in their resplendent breeding plumages—rarely if ever seen in the "lower 48". We'll make an extra effort to locate some of the accidental Asian species that regularly occur at Nome.

Cost per person is \$2500.00 which includes a \$150.00 donation to CSAS. This includes lodging, ground transportation, airport transfers, and guide services. Not included are airfare and meals. The tours are limited to four participants. The guide will be Rich Cimino of Yellowbilled Tours. Rich has led birding trips in many areas including Nome, is a Bay Area resident and CSAS member. Rich is also leading trips to New Mexico and Wisconsin in 2013. He will donate \$50.00 for each CSAS members that goes on one of these trips. Birding the Neighborhood Reports

Calaveras County: Saturday, October 13

Arnold, Meadowmont, Lakemont & White Pines. Two ladies arrived about 8:50. We waited until 9:15 for latecomers before covering the area. We observed 35 Canada Geese, numerous Brewer's Blackbirds, Steller's Jays and a Black Phoebe while waiting at the parking lot. Total species identified on trip: 19. Total birds: 345.

Tuolumne County: Sunday, October 14

Church Hill, Lambert Estates, & Standard Road. We waited till 9:10 for possible stragglers. Eight people carpoled in 2 vehicles. We spent most of our time in the Church Hill/Lambert Estates area at the end of Lambert Lake Road. Nature gave us quite a show, with Phainopeplas, Acorn Woodpeckers, Western Bluebirds, and Scrub Jays all feeding on wind-borne flying insects being carried up the hill to our location. Total number of species identified: 16. Total birds: 203. **Kenneth Smith**

Late September-October Sightings

With the beginning of Autumn comes the influx of our "Winter" birds. Late September saw the arrival of winter Finches, White and Golden-crowned Sparrows and Dark-eyed Juncos. We are also seeing a large increase in the

number of American Coot. The Ring-necked Duck, American Wigeon, and Ruddy Duck are also making an appearance on local lakes and ponds. As November progresses, we will start to see some Mergansers and Goldeneyes. John Setake of Arnold reported a Townsend's Solitaire in his yard. It was a new yard bird for him. Jeanne Ridgley, Carol Rosalind, and Bill Zachman had a Common Tern at Pine Mountain Lake. Charlotte Ginn had a flock of Sandhill Cranes on Oct. 13 and a dozen Pine Siskins on Oct. 15. The Eared Grebe at the GCS D ponds seen by Jeanne Ridgley and seven "enthusiastic birders" on Oct. 3 was another great find. That's it for now. Keep those eyes peeled while in the field!

Groveland Christmas Bird CountÁ

December 14, 2012Á

The Groveland CBC will take place on Friday, December 14th, the first day of the CBC season. I am in desperate need of additional observers to cover the circle adequately. I've moved the center of the circle a few miles to the Northeast in order to include more of our local hotspot "patches".Á

We will cover the Groveland Community Services District (Sewer Ponds) property which has been home to 131 species over the last 5 years. Also in the circle is the trail system at the Groveland District Ranger Station along Highway 120 east of Groveland (64 species in only 6 months), and the Moccasin Creek patch which includes an arm of Lake Don Pedro. (104 species over two years.) If we get enough observers we will also include the Long Gulch property east of the PML Stables, where I stumbled onto a Great Gray Owl in July. The equestrians say it has been seen as recently as October. If we get enough participants we can also cover the Priest Reservoir, at the top of the "Old Grade", an un-birded territory with great and extensive habitats.
