Sea Otter Research at Elkhorn Slough with Ron Eby & Robert Scoles

As part of a new project in Elkhorn Slough near Moss Landing, California, scientists hope to compile new data to support the recovery of the Southern Sea Otter, a federally threatened species under the Endangered Species Act. Our speakers, Ron Eby and Robert Scoles, will talk about their experiences as "citizen scientists" looking beyond what they were taught and learned from reading with respect to otters and how their work has led to the ongoing Elkhorn Slough Otter Study. Ron and Robert have not just collected data, but have also recorded with both photos and videos some of the unique and entertaining behaviors of otters in this estuarine environment. Some of these videos were recorded with the live camera that they installed at Elkhorn Slough. You can view the camera at <http://www.elkhornslough.org/ottercam/> The best times for viewing are at high tides when the largest numbers of otters are seen.

Ron Eby graduated from the Naval Academy in 1969 and the Naval Post Graduate School in 1972. After retiring as a Commander he began volunteering with the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary and Elkhorn Slough National Estuarine Research Reserve. His third and ongoing career is as a "citizen scientist" collaborating with Robert in the field and with numerous scientists, education, government and non-government institutions conducting otter and other research related to Elkhorn Slough. Robert Scoles retired from law enforcement in 2005 to become a volunteer first at the Monterey Bay Aquarium,

and then the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary. In 2007 Robert and Ron joined forces with Dr. Daniela Maldini and began a two-year study of the otters at the north harbor at Moss Landing. In early 2010 they began a study of marine mammals in the entrance to Parson's Slough as part of a tidal wetlands project which eventually inspired the current Otter project.

Please join us at 7 PM, **January 15th** at the Tuolumne County Library on Greenley Road in Sonoma. The public is always welcome and refreshments will be served after the program. Products and publications on a wide range of birding topics are on display at each meeting.

Southern African and Madagascar by Steven Umland. Part IV

Suzi, Jake, and I were back in Tana after a lovely stay in the north of Madagascar at Masoala NP. We had a few days to use up before Jake goes to visit his sister in Mozambique. What to do?? In researching for this trip, the word **Indri** kept popping up. The Indri is the largest of the lemurs and the calls it makes can be heard for miles. We hired a car and driver and headed East to Andasibe where we hoped to see (and hear) them.

We stayed at a lovely lodge on the edge of Alamontsetra NP. While we were walking down the road a gentleman on a bicycle passed us. When he saw my binoculars, he

The following morning over coffee, we heard the wail of the Indri as they let everything for miles around know where they were. Since they travel in packs, this lets all the members know where each individual is (or they are discussing the weather or the latest group gossip) and it alerts other gangs in the area as to the location of each

this park and kicked up many things we had not previously seen. At one point, I had pointed out a bird on the ground but it had disappeared. When I described it, he told the three of us to stay put and he went around the area with the hope of driving the bird toward us. His expert "driving" skills resulted in all of us seeing an out of season Scaly-breasted Ground-Roller! Maurice sure let us know how lucky we were!

At one point we were walking down a trail when an undetected troop of Indri let loose with their wailing right above us. Scared the pee out of us! It is a great sound of nature. The rest of the day was filled with similar experiences and we pulled in to the lodge late that night, beat and fulfilled.

The following day we returned to the capital for a couple of days of rest. Jake took off for Mozambique and Suzi and I prepared for the next phase of our journey to Kruger National Park in South Africa. See you then!

CSAS UPCOMING FIELD TRIPS

January 1st & February 5th, GCS D

The first Wednesday of the month Bird Walk at the Groveland Community Services property at 18966 Ferretti Road, Groveland is led by Jeanne Ridgley. The property encompasses an area of more than 200 acres of oak, pine and willow habitat with three water storage ponds. 136 species of birds have been seen there since Nov. 2007.

22 Species were seen on the Dec 4 Bird Walk. The highlight was a lone Snow Goose which flew in with 12 Canada Geese.

Dates for upcoming trips are Jan 1 and Feb 5. Meet the group in the GCS D parking lot at 8:00 AM. Bring binoculars and a birding field guide if you have one. Rain will cancel the trip. The walk will last about two-three hours.

March 8, Tuolumne River near La Grange

Join retired Columbia College biologist, **Guy Van Cleave**, for another "backyard birding" installment. We will visit the area along the Tuolumne River just downstream from La Grange (Basso Bridge Fishing Access). Other nearby sites will also be explored if time permits and participants are willing. The area in question teems with feathered vertebrates; 40+ species are not uncommon, some notables being **Phainopeplas** and Fox Sparrows.

Plan on arriving at the parking lot between 8:30 and 9 am; the fishing access is easy to find. Take J59 (La Grange Road) south toward La Grange. When you get to the stop sign turn right on Hwy 132 (Yosemite Blvd.), travel a mile or two and turn left on Lake Road. You will almost immediately see the lot on your right. (If you cross the river after the stop sign, you missed Lake Road). Bring the usual stuff: binos, hat, field guide, water, snack/lunch and weather appropriate clothing. We will do some walking on uneven terrain.

Western Birds Backyard Guide By **Bill Thompson III**, Cool Springs Press \$17.99 MSRP.

Excellent little guide to “creating a bird sanctuary in your own backyard” as the author puts it. For each species, a 2-page spread tells you how to identify it; where to find it; how you can feed it or attract it, and how it nests, along with a typical photo. In the front of the book is much information about how to set up a bird-friendly garden, plus information on suitable shrubs and flowers. All-in-all, a very useful guide for gardeners wishing to attract birds.
