Wednesday, June 1 - Groveland Community Services District (GCSD)

Please join me Wednesday June 1st. for our next Field Trip to the Groveland Community Services District. I expect there will be more Spring Migrants, Warblers, Flycatchers, Vireos etc. to see. On our last visit in May we saw 35 species. Special viewings included Bullock's Orioles, Black-headed Grosbeaks, Wood Ducks, Ash-throated Flycatcher and 4 swallow species. Many of these were our target species. A surprise was a beautiful Ruddy Duck in breeding plumage, with a lovely red brown body, brilliant white cheek patch and a bright blue bill. However, another favorite sighting was not a bird. It was a leucistic young male deer! When it came bounding across a grassy area I thought at first it was a goat! Extraordinary! We were also pleased to welcome back Jeanne Ridgley, our former Trip Leader, who has recovered from a recent fall.

Friday, June 10 - Fahey Meadow

This is an interesting habitat outside of Long Barn that I have enjoyed exploring for several years. Last year the highlight of the trip occurred on the way to Fahey. There is a bend in the road with a water seep that tends to attract a few birds and I usually make a brief stop. Well, we ended up seeing 40 species! We were all thrilled and spent an hour there. We of course will stop this year, too, but I cannot guarantee such variety. While we may not see a high number of species at the Meadow, I believe we will see some more unusual ones. Highlights from past visits have included Calliope Hummingbird, Green-tailed Towhee, Lawrence's Goldfinch, Chipping Sparrow and some Warblers and Flycatchers, as well. Please bring snacks/lunch, water and sunscreen.

We will meet at the Mi-Wok Ranger Station (along Hwy 108 less than 10 minutes above Twain Harte) at 8:00 am. We hope to have car pooling available for fully vaccinated attendees or at the discretion of those driving. It will be about a 40 minute drive from the ranger station. We will make a brief pit stop at the North Fork Day Use Area on our way out. There are no facilities at the Meadow. We will return to this site for our lunch where there are picnic tables overlooking the river. We got to see an American Dipper here last time! The trip will involve walking on mostly level terrain of about a mile. We should be back to the ranger station by 1:30 or 2:00 pm.

MAY FIELD TRIP REPORTS

May 3 - Westside Trail

Eight dedicated Birders joined me for a morning walk along this old railroad trail for great views of the Tuolumne River below, wild flowers and birds above. This walk yielded 12 bird species and lots of wildflowers. One highlight was the Black Headed Grosbeak who was singing his/ her heart out, another highlight was a Flycatcher that we could not specifically identify the subspecies, and a mystery bird 75 feet in the air that resembled a hummer with a long beak. The wild flowers were prevalent, with the Chinese Lanterns and Mariposa Lilies as two favorites.

Our birding experts included Tom Parrington, Paolo Maffei, and Cyril Ashe. Sheila Shanahan used the Merlin app to identify the Orange Crowned Warbler (which we could only hear and not see). Welcome to a new birder, Gary Lee. Thank you to everyone who participated.

May 12 - Wards Ferry Walk

On Thursday, May 12, after a three week rain delay, nine birders gathered at the Parrington Barn for another walk along Wards Ferry Road to beyond the intersection with Algerine Wards Ferry Road. Perfect weather in the mid-60s. Bird sightings totaled 36 species with highlights that included a Golden Eagle, Phainopepla, a Western Tanager, and the usual Western Kingbird in the open pasture area. Our resident bird identification specialists for this walk were Ron and Barbara McDow, and Kit DeGear who spotted more bird species that I have seen all year. In addition to the walk along the Road, most of us walked through the neighboring Kiriluk Ranch to the overlook into Turnback Creek with its unusual limestone formations. Lunch at the barn followed. Tom was missed but the app worked great, particularly on those tricky Warblers! Highlights included Orange-crowned, Nashville, MacGillivray's and Wilson's Warblers, Warbling Vireo, White-headed Woodpeckers, Bullock's Orioles, Black-headed Grosbeaks as well as the Olive-sided Flycatcher. May 29 - Indigony



We were able to observe both the male and female. Other highlights included viewing a gorgeous male Western Tanager, Western Wood-Pee-wee, a Bewick's Wren and an Osprey.
