Burrowing Owls by Caitlyn Rich

A vian Research Technician, Caitlyn Rich, will be giving a presentation on Burrowing Owls. She will share how prairie dogs are both their housemates and their threats, and how scientists can create an estimation of how many owls are in the wild, etc.



aitlyn was our scholarship awardee in 2018 and 2019 after attending Summerville High School in Tuolumne County followed by UC Santa Cruz with a major in Ecology and Evolutionary Biology. She was recently the field biologist with CSERC, caring for our local wildlife and environments, and is now in Colorado where she worked on a project for Colorado Parks and Wildlife doing a population assessment of Burrowing Owls across eastern Colorado.

We were able to observe 23 species which is a good number for this time of year. Highlights included good views of Red-breasted Sapsucker, White-headed Woodpecker, Pacific Wren and MacGillivray's Warbler. While we did not get a glimpse of the Pileated Woodpecker we certainly heard its loud drumming. We enjoyed walks through the North Grove, Scenic Overlook and out from the South Grove. June 29 - Ackerson Meadow

A ckerson Meadow is along Evergreen Road on the way to Hetch Hetchy where our target bird was the Black-backed Woodpecker – and we saw not just one but two! A lifer for me and others. Other highlights included Pygmy Nuthatch, Pacific-slope Flycatcher, Red-breasted Sapsucker, Cassin's and Purple Finches and White-headed Woodpecker plus a beautiful male Calliope Hummingbird. Some of us did see the Chestnut-backed Chickadee and Brown Creeper at Carlin Falls and at least a half dozen Band-tailed Pigeons at Hardin Flat Road. Total for the day 37 species! July 1 - Guided Trip for Out-of-Towners

A couple, John and Ana Hilda Mosher from Corte Madera, contacted me via email. They were hoping to join one of our scheduled field trips or get a name of a guide in our area. While I was planning a couple of outings for a few of us the trips did not fall into their time frame. However, I love birding and showing fellow birders some of my favorite areas, so I offered to take them out. They had a target list and I tried to pick a locale that would allow for the opportunity to see those species. I settled on a trip to the Bennett Juniper. We had a great day and saw many species with, fortunately, some on their list. I took them to Donnells Vista, too. A day with many beautiful scenic views.

I had recently seen the Black-backed Woodpecker, another bird on their list, at Ackerson Meadow so I proposed an additional trip there. We met the McDows 2 days later, who lent their expertise in addition to my just general enthusiasm. Unfortunately, the Black-backed was a no-show for us although the McDows saw it before we arrived. We were only able to hear the distinctive drumming. We did get a brief glimpse and much singing from a Grasshopper Sparrow which is rare in our county. We had nice observations of Cassin's Finch and Lawrence's Finch as well. They very kindly took me for lunch at the Evergreen Lodge. A very nice treat! While I would never bill myself as a guide, I did enjoy showing them some of our great birding sites in our county. I got a very nice card from them. They have joined our chapter and made a donation.

Aug. 16 - A "Double Dipper Day"

Six of us escaped the 100+ temps and headed up Hwy 108 to higher elevations and cooler weather. We birded around Niagara Campground just off the highway on Eagle Meadow Rd. Then we headed to Clarks Fork Rd. all the way out to the end to Horse Meadow. The birds were much quieter and harder to spot than on earlier junkets. Juveniles in rough plumage kept us on our toes. We still had a great day and saw many good birds. Highlights included Hermit and Wilson's Warbler, Cooper's Hawk, a Clark's Nutcracker and two American Dippers! Looking forward to the return of our regularly scheduled and advertised outings this fall.
